

Carrie French was a Caldwell, Idaho local. She graduated from High School and went straight from being a varsity cheerleader to Army soldier heading to Iraq. Her positive nature and unique ability to comfort those around her with care and love made her the embodiment of camaraderie and friendship.

On June 5th, 2005, Carrie was killed by a road side bomb outside of Kirkuk, Iraq while volunteering for a supply mission convoy, making her the first Idaho woman to be killed at war. Her sacrifice and ability to touch and inspire lives to this day will never be forgotten.
